

Joanna C. Hendon is a partner at Spears & Imes LLP. She has been a litigator for more than 20 years, with substantial trial experience. Ms. Hendon represents individuals and entities in white collar and civil matters. She recently represented the former Dell Inc. employee accused of but never charged with leaking confidential information to securities analysts in *United States v. Newman, et al.*, 13-1837 (2d. Cir. April 3, 2015) and *United States v. Steinberg*, 14-2141 (2d Cir.), and the former Pershing Square Capital Management L.P. analyst accused of but never charged with disclosing information concerning Herbalife, Ltd., to his roommate in *In the Matter of Filip Szymick*, Adm. Proc. File No. 3-16183, and *Peixoto v. Securities and Exchange Commission*, 14 Civ. 8634 (WHP). In 2011, Ms. Hendon defended the first of the “expert network” insider trading cases tried to verdict in the Southern District of New York, *United States v. Jiau*, 11 Cr. 161 (JSR). Early in her career Ms. Hendon was a federal prosecutor in the Southern District of New York, where she served in the Securities and Commodities Fraud Unit and prosecuted cases involving securities fraud, bribery, mail and wire fraud, and tax fraud. In 2000, Ms. Hendon received the U.S. Attorney General’s John Marshall Award, the Department of Justice’s highest award for excellence at trial. Ms. Hendon is a member of the New York Council of Defense Lawyers, the Association of the Bar of the City of New York, and the New York State Bar Association. For the past seven years she has co-chaired the White Collar Litigation Committee of the NYSBA. Between 2009 and 2012 she was an adjunct professor at Fordham Law School, where she co-taught a course entitled Fraud, Insider Trading and Other Securities Law Topics. Ms. Hendon is currently a member of the Steering Committee of the Forum on Corporate Enforcement. She earned her B.A. (Hon.) in 1987 from the University of British Columbia and her J.D. in 1991 from the Yale Law School. Between 1991 and 1992 Ms. Hendon

clerked for the Honorable Frank M. Coffin on the United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit.
